KNOW YOUR RIGHTS!

Every individual, regardless of immigration status, deserves dignity.

The U.S. Constitution guarantees rights to everybody in the United States, including undocumented people. If you are approached by law enforcement or ICE agents, it is important to know your rights.

Anywhere:

You have the right to remain silent.

You do not have to tell a law enforcement officer anything about your immigration status or nationality.

You do not have to answer questions.

Anything you say could be used against you later.





PROTECTING FAITH AND FREEDOM

At Home:

If ICE comes to your door, you have the **right to refuse entry**. You do not have to open the door.

You have the **right to refuse searching of your person or your property**. You do not have to
consent to ICE entering or
searching your property, or
searching your person.



If ICE does not have your consent, then they must have a valid judicial warrant signed by a judge. You can ask to see this and ID in writing, and have them slid under the door.

ICE may **only do** what the judge says they can do **in the warrant**. If an officer tells you they have a warrant, you **can ask them for identification and to see the warrant**.

In Public:

If a law enforcement or ICE agent approaches you in public, you are free to leave, unless you are being detained.



If you are detained, you have the right to consult an attorney.
You do not have to sign any paperwork.

An attorney can help advise you about any paperwork you are asked to sign.

If you need help, you can call an immigrant rights organization that offers confidential support and assistance.
